



THE HEESWIJK

Pronounced 'Hayswick' ([Dutch] Hees household)



The summer home of J. Ledlie Hees Built in 1899 as a summer cottage, later a large addition was added. Located in the Sacandaga Park.

J. Ledlie Hees was the President of the F. J. & G Rail Road 1897-1933. He built his summer home in the Sacandaga Park where he often rode the train from Gloversville and exited the train right in front of his summer home, the Heeswijk.

The first structure was a modest summer Dutch Colonial. In 1909, Mr. Hees added a huge addition at a cost of \$200,000.00. The inside paneling and woodwork were made of walnut, ebony and mahogany which were imported from the Netherlands and special stained-glass windows with Hees' initials on them and imported from Italy.

The foyer was 22' by 12'. There were 9 bedrooms and private baths on the second floor and 3 bedrooms downstairs for the chauffeurs and the butler. There was a large kitchen, library, dining room with a semi-circular piazza.

He decorated the living room with hand painted murals of windmills, and Dutch canals in keeping with his Dutch heritage. Pres. Warren Harding stayed in the mansion one night in the early 1920s as the house guest of the Hees family.

Mr. Hees was born in Palatine Bridge, Montgomery County in 1862, He died in 1940 of a heart attack at his summer home in Sacandaga Park. He was a banker, railroader, pioneer in electric lighting and power development, a most ambitious and successful business man. He was married first to Adela Moore, they adopted a daughter. After Adela died he married Patricia Miller in 1919. His daughter, became Mrs. Jesse Macon.



MORE ABOUT J LEDLIE HEES

Mr. Hees was a staunch Republican. During the period from 1894 and 1899 when his brother-in-law A. B. Colvin, of Glens Falls was the incumbent in his position as State Treasurer, Mr. Hees was elected delegate to the National Republican convention from the 30th Congressional District of New York. In 1912 and for several years was state committeeman for Montgomery County.



HEESWYJK SOLD

1943 an auction was held to sell J. Ledlie's Heeswyjk. Ledlie had died in 1940. The bidding started at \$3,500. The final bid went to Earl W. Hathaway at \$8,001. A newspaper article stated that the sale comprised a 20 room two-story residence which has 9 bedrooms, eight bathrooms, two barns, a four car garage, playhouse, servants quarter, a laundry, ice house and other out-buildings.

B. William DeLia bought Heeswyjk to house actors and actresses that performed in the Sacandaga Summer Theater. Among them were Charlton Heston and Tallulah Bankhead. Frank Izzo ran a restaurant there for about a year.

The Sacandaga Summer Theater was founded in 1955, to bring back a theater to replace the former rustic theater. It was a community owned project. James Reutling; president, Dr. Clem Gritsavage; vice-president, Hugh Smith; Secretary and Dave Corwin Treasurer. The "First Nighters Club", composed of stock owners, met at Heeswyjk Mansion before each opening night's performance, where they had the opportunity to meet members of the company, actresses and actors.
